### Why Reform Early Childhood Governance?



- Streamline processes and reduce burdens for families, providers, and communities
- Increase government accountability for programing by creating a single authority over programming
- Reduce bureaucracy and red tape required to access various services and programs
- Enhance the current mixed delivery system driven by what's best for parents and children
- Eliminate duplication and overlap of work

#### Questions and comments:

Were there discussions about Part C programs moving? Why was the Dept. of Ed. The suggested place?

Part C placement wasn't discussed in-depth. However, moving Part C into another agency wouldn't solve the problem of transitions. Part B must remain in Dept. of Ed. by law. It's merely a future consideration made by the Task Force to move Part C.

#### How can Part C programs stay informed and provide feedback?

The Task Force didn't request feedback from Part C because it wasn't discussed in-depth. Solving transition issues is an issue brought to the Task Force.

#### Were there any parents on the Task Force?

The executive order didn't specify a parent member. However, a handful of the members are providers & business leaders and parents.

If you are consolidating agency programs, what would the costs be, specifically FTE?

In Appendix of the report, the programs recommended for moving are listed. It lists the FTE and funding allotted currently. Since there aren't any recommendations to add programs, it's a reallocation and combining of resources, not necessarily adding.

If the conversation continues about moving Part C, how to we stay informed? There isn't currently a group discussing the movement of Part C. If discussion progress, I urge the council to be involved.

Since the role of the SICC is to advise and assist in providing services for children birth to age 5, was there any discussion about engaging the SICC in the decision-making process?

No, because it wasn't a consideration or a formal recommendation to move Part C. If there is discussion around that topic, it makes sense that the SICC would have a voice. There is a section in the report around the future considerations to just say these were elevated, and transition issues was certainly an issue that was elevated. The Task Force did not feel was appropriate to fully address this issue or that it was part of the scope of the Task Force's work.

## It's my understanding that Part B 619 must stay with the Department of Education. Was that discussed?

You are correct. It was mentioned, but the Task Force was charged with what goes into this new entity. We knew that we couldn't combine them in the possible new entity, so the movement of Part C was not significantly discussed.

## State Performance Plan/ Annual Performance Review (SPP/APR) update

Office of Special Programs (OSEP) requires states to update targets every 5 years. One single year must be used for all performance indicator targets. (New regulation) Compliance indicator targets must be 100%

The recommendation of the SICC's SPP/APR committee is to FY2021

#### Pros of FFY2021

- It is in line with state initiatives to serve more children in early childhood
- State activities in place to support achieving future targets
- Changes are more even distribution across indicators
- The most recent baseline year
- The baseline year preferred based on stakeholder feedback

#### Questions and comments:

#### How are you determining the target?

Begin with the baseline year and increase performance by 0.1% each year. The Annual SPP/APR Report will show if Kansas have met the target or not. If the target isn't met, the state will need to report the plan for improvement.

#### When does this go into effect?

Possibly, this coming year. Kansas is waiting on confirmation of the implementation year.

This is a difficult concept to grasp. Our Part C programs are going to need support understanding the new targets, especially child find for birth to age one. Programs are going to need support in meeting the increased target.

#### What are the indicators?

Review of all indicators (I attached a list at the end of the minutes.)

How are we reaching families with information about early intervention and education programs? Especially families with risk factors.

Focus groups would be a good idea to inform families and help them feel more comfortable with accepting services. We do need to get into the community to share information and listen to specific challenges.

We need to do more Child Find activities and screening opportunities. However, we need to add staff to be able to do these activities and to provide services.

Kansas is above the national average on the percent of children being served.

Ann Elliott motioned to accept the recommendation of the SPP/APR Committee. Lisa Collette seconded the acceptance of the recommendation.

All votes were in the affirmative.

## **Grant Applications:**

Harvey County ICC applied for grant funds. They are requesting \$1000.00 to support and reimburse cost for families to attend meetings.

Susan Bowles moved to approve the grant application Ann Elliott seconded the motion. Everyone voted in the affirmative.
