Information from Questions asked during presentation

Does the military create a high percentage of student turnover?

- Not until 10th grade due to Ft. Leavenworth having their own school (pre-k-9)
- Many military families send their children to Leavenworth public schools for 9th grade for a consistent high school career.

What is your percentage of students Identified as a student with a disability?

- 24%
- They have ALL of early childhood special education student programs at the center including pre-K itinerate service.

Do the students at your center have medical disability or learning disabilities?

- Both
- In early childhood students often have a developmental delay identification.
- Specific identifications begin at the end of kindergarten.

What credentials do your teachers have?

- Early C U certification

Are there any unidentified students?

- Yes, peer models and traditional kindergarten students

Do you have problems with recruiting and retaining staff?

- Yes. COVID has exasperated this issue. There is also the tax on keep staff educated.

State Program Update:

Amanda Peterson, KSDE EC Director Outcomes for Measuring – ASQ

We'll be reviewing data every 6 months during SICC meetings

Discussions heard from around the state:

- There is a concern that there aren't enough ASQ trainers.
- Physicians are becoming more aware of the ASQ.

- Ages & Stages Questionnaires®, Third Edition (ASQ-3)
 - Addresses five developmental areas: communication, gross motor, fine motor, problem-solving and personal-social
- Ages & Stages Questionnaires®: Social-Emotional, Second Edition ASQ:SE-2
 - Addresses seven social-emotional areas: self-regulation, compliance, communication, adaptive behaviors, autonomy, affect and interaction with people

Beginning in 2015, Kansas has done intention work to identify more students and students sooner.

All In for Kansas Kids Strategic Plan

- Assisted in the plans to assess kindergarten readiness using the ASQ.

Kansas is working to update the needs assessment and strategic plan in 2023.

Goal 2, Community-Level Coordination, Strategy 2.1: Develop localized comprehensive resource and referral networks that meet community specific needs to drive quality referrals, coordinate care, and ease navigation for families.

Tactic 2.1.3 Use evidence-based, standardized screenings such as the Ages & Stages Questionnaires (ASQ) and the Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale to identify needs and connect families to the right services as early as possible.

Goal 5, Capacity & Access, Strategy 5.4: Support communicates, educational environments, families, and children to ensure that each child entering kindergarten at age five is socially, emotionally, and academically prepared.

Tactic 5.4.1 Provide information to families and technical assistance to school systems to increase the number of students who participate in the Kindergarten Readiness Snapshot (the Ages and Stages Questionnaires).

Highlights of the Kansas ASQ data:

This is aggregate data. *Amanda will be sharing the slides with everyone in the next few weeks.

The number of ASQ screenings has increased consistently since 2018.

In 2022, there were 45,033 ASQ-3 screenings completed and 43,071 ASQ:SE-2 screenings completed.

More younger students (>60 months) are being screened in Kansas:

In 2021, 72% of the screenings completed were the 72-month and 60-month screenings combined.

In 2022, 60% of screenings were the 72- and 60-month screenings.

We reviewed the results of the screenings for the years 2019 - 2022. It was noted that fine motor scores are lower than other areas. This has also been an observance of our partners.

Next, we reviewed the results of the screenings by age for 2022.

It was noted that the fine motor results varied by age but continues to be a higher area of need.

What's ahead: Kansas Kindergarten Readiness Snapshot 2023-24

- ASQ tool to start building the partnership/relationships between school and families.
- Kansas schools are required to use the ASQ to partner with families and share the information gathered from the ASQ in a timely manner.
- Screening window is April 1st Sept. 20
- Oct. 10: Data is due
- NOT a screening tool to prevent a child from attending kindergarten

Questions and comments:

Are any of the ASQ guestions inclusive of children with special needs?

The state has worked to communicate that not all families need to complete the ASQ if needs are already identified, especially if there are multiple needs. The ASQ is a screener to identify areas of concerns. If a team has already identified the areas of concern, then the ASQ is not needed. Families can also opt-out. Some students are given the AEPS to identify needs in students with significant delays. If a child has an active IFSP then an ASQ may not be appropriate.

Has there been an increase in referrals due to more screenings?

Kansas is following the trends that are being seen across the United States so the increase in referrals can't be attributed to the increase in the number of screenings. **At the March meeting we'll review the part B & C raw data and national trend data regarding the number of referrals.

What percentage of students identified as needing monitoring or at-risk are receiving services?

We don't have access to personalized data so we can't track individuals.

There was interest from several attendees to see the raw numbers for the ASQ results as opposed to the percentages.

<u>COVID concerns: It may be worth investigating how COVID has affected student's</u> results.

The Kansas State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m., or as soon thereafter as possible, on Tuesday, May 9, 2023, in the Board Room of the Landon State Office Building to consider the adoption of proposed emergency safety intervention administrative regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of the Kansas State Board of Education at the address below or by email to bhughes@ksde.org. The address for the Kansas State Board of Education is Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson Ave., Suite 102, Topeka, Kansas 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed regulations during the public hearing.

Visit To review the proposed amendments and the economic impact statement, visit Emergency Safety Interventions (ESI) (ksde.org). You may also visit KSDE Weekly to read the full article.

Emergency safety intervention requirements apply to **all** students and to **any** learning environment, including any nonprofit institutional day or residential school and any accredited nonpublic school that receives public funding or over which KSDE has regulatory authority. This definition includes **preschools run by public school districts** and accredited nonpublic schools.

To advance **kindergarten readiness**, all Kansas elementary schools are required to partner with families to better understand incoming kindergarten students' development. The Ages & Stages Questionnaires®, Third Edition (ASQ-3) and Ages & Stages Questionnaires®: Social-Emotional, Second Edition (ASQ:SE-2) provide a snapshot of children's developmental milestones. As caregivers know their children best, they complete both questionnaires.

Since districts first implemented the Kindergarten Readiness Snapshot statewide in fall 2018, KSDE has gathered feedback on how to best use this tool to improve kindergarten readiness. After receiving positive feedback, KSDE began offering the flexibility to partner with families of incoming kindergarten students to complete the Kindergarten Readiness Snapshot (ASQ) in the **springtime before children enter kindergarten**.

For the 2023-24 Kindergarten Readiness Snapshot, districts and private school systems may begin screening April 1. Please contact Amy Rzadczynski via email at arzadczynski@ksde.org if you would like to begin prior to April 1. All schools must administer the ASQ to incoming kindergarten students by Sept. 20, and all data (including pending Family Access screenings) must be entered into ASQ Online by Oct. 10. The Kansas State Department of Education's (KSDE) **Child Nutrition and Wellness (CNW)** team will host a town hall meeting at **2 p.m. Feb. 21 via Zoom**. Agenda items for the February town hall meeting include new guidance from the United State Department of Agriculture, School Breakfast Week, new CNW website and more. The **Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)** is looking for sponsors willing to provide nutritious meals to Kansas children during the summer months. A program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), SFSP provides reimbursement to schools, public agencies and private nonprofit organizations for food services.

The goal of the SFSP is to ensure children in high-poverty areas continue to receive nutritious meals when the low-cost or free school meals provided through the Child Nutrition Programs of the USDA are no longer available. SFSP sponsors receive reimbursements for documenting and serving healthy meals to **children between 1 and 18 years of age** at approved sites in needy areas. These nutritional opportunities help keep children ready to learn when school resumes. Proper nutrition is a critical component of reaching the Kansas State Board of Education's vision for education — Kansas leads the world in the success of each student.


As Kansas students continue to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, Gov. Laura Kelly announced earlier this week the creation of the Kansas Education Enrichment Program (KEEP), which will provide qualifying parents and guardians with a one-time \$1,000 award per child to pay for educational goods and services, such as tutoring and school supplies. KEEP will open for application on Feb. 22.

Students whose household income is less than 185% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines will be eligible for KEEP funds. KEEP funds will be able to be used on enrichment and educational activities including:

• The purchase of curriculum and educational materials, including school supplies and certain allowed technological devices.

- Camps with academic-related curriculum, such as music, arts, science, technology, agriculture, mathematics and engineering.
- Tutoring.
- Language classes.
- Musical instruments and lessons.
- The funds won't be eligible for private school tuition.

Parents and guardians may select enrichment and educational activities from approved service providers via the online **KEEP Marketplace** or request that a service provider be approved and added to the statewide directory. View the full article or more information
